SOCIAL NEWS

For our picnic in the Botanic Park on Sunday 2nd March, we had a very warm day, and lunch was an extremely casual affair, extending into mid afternoon. Those who did not attend missed out on a pleasant day and the opportunity to catch up on the latest gossip.

The picnic gear was finally packed away, and we proceeded to the Botanic Gardens, where our first stop was to inspect the new Schaumburg glasshouse. The outer section contained several orchids, which were severely damaged by the recent hot weather conditions. Badly scorched were sobralias, brassias, zygopetalums, and some cattleyas were just holding their own. In best condition were some Schomburgkia superbiens donated by Ted Braddock last year in memory of his late wife.

A number of bromeliads were also nearly dead with scorching, as were other plants. The house was certainly not suitable for plants under our summer conditions, and how anyone with a horticultural background could imagine plants will survive under open glass in our climate defies any form of logic. Some scorched plants had been replaced since a recent visit, and signs erected noting that steps were being taken to overcome the problem. (Why not a covering of shade cloth, for goodness sake.) The consensus was that it was an architectural triumph, but a horticultural disaster.

Next stop was the elegant Palm House which was completely renovated, and ventilated with fans, and the Madagascan plants are thriving. At the western end is a grotto with running water, where we found orchids growing.

After a cafe stop to top up our caffeine levels, and feed the ducks, we inspected the Simpson shadehouse, which contained some large dendrobiums, and a *Calanthe triplicata* (the Christmas orchid) in bloom.

The superb Tropical Glasshouse was next, where for a small admission, we wandered amongst unusual ferns, palms and insects in a humid but not unbearable atmosphere. Orchids, which were once seen in this house,

were not so evident, only a few tree mounted Dens. to be seen.

After regrouping outside, it was time to go our separate ways after a very pleasant day's outing. Perhaps you, too could consider joining our next jaunt. These outings are organised for your pleasure and participation, and everyone, friends and family are always welcome.

KEL's CORNER

The meeting of 20th February 2008 was down a little on plant numbers but the Open Section was represented with a good display of flowers.

C. Lulu 'Pink Blush' from R. & B. Wilson was growing in a 17cm pot the flowers pale pink heavily spotted brown with also a pale pink labellum. There were 7 flowers and 4 buds to open.

G. & L. Spears' *C. Valentine Day* 'Rosalie' was growing in a 20cm pot and had many growths. There were 3 racemes each carrying up to 12 nice cluster red/purple flowers.

Another nice *C. Valentine Day* was grown by A. & M. Phillips; the plant was in a 25cm pot which was filled. There were 4 racemes, the flowers red/brown in colour, each with 9 plus flowers.

There is a colour variation in the *Valentine Day* plants, some flowers are a dull red colour others red/ brown, red/ purple and some quite brilliant purple in colour. All about 8 to 9cm in size and all attractive and worth having in a collection.

Noel Oliver's *Colm. Wildcat* 'Panther' was growing in a 17cm pot, the racemes to over 1m. tall were covered with many yellow flowers and a red spotted labellum on a yellow background, a nice plant.

Den. Fire Coral belonging to G. & C. Hime is a completely different one from those of the hard cane types. This plant carried a nice lot of 7 ½ to 8 cm white flowers with yellow striped orange in the labellum. The plant was growing in a 17cm pot.

An unusual plant benched was *Anguloa brevilabia* belonging to R. & B. Wilson & was growing in a 12 ½ cm pot with 2 bulbs, 1 raceme and 1 growth. There was one 7 ½ cm flower, yellow outside, inside a red/orange colour. Unfortunately the flowers do not open sufficiently to allow one to see the beauty of this type of flower.

D. Higgs lovely *Phrag. Andean Fire* had 1 flower of a brilliant red colour, another bud

and a small bud to continue the flowering. The plant was growing in a cut off 7 ½ cm drink container and doing very well.

Z. Kiwi Choice 'Eileen' belonging to R. & L. Gunn was growing in a 20cm pot and having 5 flowers on 1 raceme of green heavily barred brown, the labellum was purple with a white tip.

There were three seedlings belonging to the owners, Z. Artur Elle 'Essendon' X Z. Jade Dragon 'Chocolate with brown petals and purple lips, 2 seedlings were very similar whilst the other was different in several ways. Seedlings even from the same crossings can vary, - interesting to make comparisons.

On the First Division a plant of *Srts. Toowoomba Sparkle* 'Coconut Ice' grown by K. Trevan looked like a small *Vanda* but with strong 5cm wide leaves. The plant was growing in a 20cm squat pot. There were ten 5cm white flowers spotted pink. Looking at the plant it could be seen that it is a very regular flowerer by all the old racemes visible between the leaves.

J & R Dunn's *Den. Autumn* x *Rutherford Starburst* had one spike of green, with faint spots and a pink labellum, nice blooms with much potential for the future.

Another fine *C Valentine Day* 'Osborne' from B & S Brand, had a 20cm pot with 6 canes, and a nice head of 12 blooms red/brown in colour.

M & M Pages' *Oncid. Kaulani* was growing strongly in a 12 cm pot, with two fine raceme of small pink blooms – always an attractive *oncidium*.

In Second Div. a newer member, B Semmens had a magnificently growing cattleya plant almost $\frac{3}{4}$ metre across. There were 4 racemes of 4/5 flowers in deep pink open, but with many more buds coming along. This plant will look a picture when the blooms open, and with excellent foliage, too.

All plants are welcomed with the difficult growing conditions we have been experiencing, but all plants tabled looked well, and showed evidence of good culture, and are a credit to the owners.

PROPAGATING PHAIUS.

Phaius tankervilleae is a very desirable Australian terrestrial orchid, large and spectacular, which may explain why it is now rare in its natural swampy habitat.

I remember our old member, the late Mr. Merv Green explain how it can be propagated from the flowering stem of the plant. Along the stem, where the bracts join the main stem, there are dormant eyes which can be stimulated to grow and provide new plants. The trick is to place cut lengths of stem containing an eye on sphagnum moss, and place them in warm, humid conditions. With luck, the eyes will develop and provide you with new small plants which develop like the usual keikis found on native dendrobiums.

Another method which I've heard about is to place sections of stem with two eyes in a jar of water, with the top of the stem above the water level, with the nodes submerged. After the eyes develop roots and leaves, the stem is cut and the plantlet allowed to grow normally, with adequate light, warmth and humidity.

I've noticed zygopetalum flower stems with eyes on occasion, so perhaps this method maybe worth a try if you have a suitable stem.
