THIS MEETING Wednesday 20thth January 2021.

There will be a number of changes to the format of our January meeting this year. First, we will hold our Annual General meeting, which was to have been held last November. We have sufficient nominations not to need a ballot for positions, so don't stay away on that account.

Our January meeting in recent years has been a review of the best seedlings presented over the last year, and views of some of the most spectacular or unusual orchids grown by our members. This review is led by our Registrar, Don Higgs, principally aided by photographs taken by our official photographer of long standing, John Seidel. We have been unable to hold meetings for the larger portion of the year, with disruption to the usual allocation of points towards the Annual Perpetual trophies. Where we could

A 'VIRTUAL' VISIT.

No, I haven't succumbed to the internet disease, but I made a 'virtual' visit to the home of Fred Cawse earlier this month to see how his vandas are faring this year. I had been impressed with his culture on previous occasions, and his plants are still growing strongly. Fred grows his orchids inside a converted garage style frame clad with fibreglass, and has engineered the conditions to suit his plants, (which we have been accustomed to know as 'hot house' types). Fred grows his cold, and they're doing great.



We have become used to seeing Fred bringing his vandas, cattleyas, etc along to meetings, so when he invited me over recently, I jumped at the chance to show you some pictures of his setup.

His larger vanda types are hanging along a suspended pipe so the roots and humidity enhancing tillandsia plants festoon and hang among the orchids to keep the atmosphere buoyant. On two sets of wire frame benches grow his normally potted plants, and underneath baby's tears grow profusely, which also enhances the humidity.



Fred's plants appear to be growing in normal, bark based mixture, and are sturdy and strong. A number of cattleya propagations are growing sturdily, and his oncidium types are making multiple growths and have big, healthy pseudobulbs.

I omitted to ask Fred what he feeds them on, and the frequency, but you can ask him yourselves when he brings some plants along for the show benches. I'm sure he would be delighted to have a chat. It could well be to your advantage to discuss how he grows his plants so well

. Fred brings some of his more spectacular efforts, like this Vanda Wirat, up under his back verandah for everyone to admire.

This plant had 4 spikes of large blooms of an eyecatching colour (my camera could not capture the violetblue colour properly, possibly because of the translucent colour of the roof) but you may recall Fred showing divisions of this plant at meetings and shows previously over the years.

CATTLEYA CULTURE (cont. from Dec) Back cutting – A good way to develop a

specimen plant

Some cattleyas (those with only short rhizomes connecting the pseudobulbs) make more compact plants which have more pseudobulbs to the potful. If your plant does not have the tendency to development many leads, you can make the plant develop more dormant eyes by chopping the rhizome right through every 3 to 5 growths without otherwise disturbing the plant. This forces dormant eyes into growth, thus more pseudobulbs and hence blooms.
