Growing Coelogynes By Anton Drew

This is a synopsis of how I grow the genus Coelogyne, specifically, species Coelogyne.

First a brief overview of the genus.

Coelogyne is an Asiatic genus that can be found at sea level to the tops of the tropical mountains. Identifying coelogynes has always been problematic, the islands of Borneo and Sumatra are rich in species of the genus but few keys are currently available to identify them.

In 1821, John Lindley, in his "Collectanea Botanica", named and described the genus Coelogyne based upon Coelogyne cristata Lindl. and Coelogyne punctata Lindl. The genus consists of 190 known species, two additional subspecies and 12 additional varieties giving a total of 204 taxa.

Since records began, over 400 taxa have been included in the genus at various times. Many of these have subsequently been proven to be synonyms or taxa that were placed in the wrong genus. Synonyms and other taxa formerly in *Coelogyne* are detailed in the Index of Synonyms and Excluded Species.

In my collection, I have specialised in collecting species rather than man made hybridisations as I prefer the pure flowers as they would be found in the wild, therefore my culture is to mimic their natural conditions which include high humidity (60% -90%), temperature range from 15C to 32C, and plenty of air movement.

In the wild, Coelogyne don't grow in bark, hence I only use sphagnum moss which is found on the trees they grow on. My mix is ½ sphagnum moss, ¼ Perlite for moisture retention as Adelaide has a very dry atmosphere (Av RH 1% to 25%), and charcoal to keep the mix sweet. Generally, I repot about 3 yearly for smaller plants not filling the pot, and for larger plants as needed when on potting or dividing.

I keep the mix quite damp and feed once a week in summer and 2 to 3 weekly in Winter depending on the moisture content in the pots. I vary the orchid food so they get a good range of nutrients; we don't like to eat the same food and neither do they. ;o)

I have the majority of my collection in hanging pots to get bright sunlight.

At present I have around 26 plants in my collection including 3 which have been awarded by the AOC, and these plant range in size from small *C. swaninana* up to extremely large *C. mayeriana* (1.5 m high x .5m across) and *pulverula* canopy 1.5m across with leaves 500mm long).

I have varied my collection to have plants flowering at different times of the year so there is always a show of colour in the warm-house.

PLANTS SHOWN LAST MONTH

Second Division and Registrar's Choice

Cattleya. Unknown, Grown by Pat & John Carmen. With 3 inflorescences supporting 4 flowers and clean foliage, this was an eye catching plant. The 85mm (w) x 100 mm(h) flowers were a delicate pink encircling contrasting dark mauve labellums with a splash of yellow in the throat. It is grown in small bark in a 16cm pot and John told me he has had this plant for 20 plus years.



First Division

Stenoglotis (Sngl) longifolia, owned by Peter and Helen Haltis. Peter has owned this plant, which is growing in the original mix of sand and peat moss in a 140mm pot, for a year. It had 10 strong inflorescences of even height carried many fresh flowers and, a progressive flowerer, being many buds still to come. plant is grown under 50% shade cloth and on average Peter waters the plant 3 times a week and if the temperature is over 35C it gets misted for 2 minutes 3 times a day

South Australian Orchid Fair Formerly SAROC

The Fair will again be held on the long weekend in June, with the venue open from 9.a.m. on Friday to allow setting up of the Kitchen and

the arrangement of displays and vendors.

It should be noted that the venue will not be open to anyone other than those setting up.

Plants for display can be brought in from midday and displays arranged ready for judging on Friday night.

We have a new venue this year, The Campbelltown Function Centre at 172 Montacute Road, Rostrevor, a more pleasing venue with plenty of parking. It should be noted that the venue will not be open to anyone other than those setting up.

We do not have to take most of our house to the venue; pie warmer, working stove, fridges, microwave etc are all on site and in working order, unlike the last venue. We do not have to pay for parking which was not available last year due to the football and the ice arena, nor are we being charged to help pay for the redevelopment.

Once again, the SA Orchidaceous Society is responsible for the kitchen and we are inviting all members to help whenever they can. This could be by supplying scones, jam, or soup and helping in the kitchen on Saturday and Sunday. (Hopefully we will have enough helpers for Friday in the kitchen). A roster and donation sheet will be available at the May meeting to make your commitment.

A Fair dinner will be held on Saturday Night, June 11. This will be held at the Tower Hotel on the corner of Magill and St. Bernards Road, about 1½ kms. from the show venue.
