# The Story of the Genus Cattleya by Peter Haltis

In the 19<sup>th</sup> Century, the British Empire spanned almost the entire world. Their appetite for acquiring new things in order to improve their scientific, economic and other horizons was insatiable. An interest in acquiring new and exotic plants was part of their quest. In 1818, a prominent English horticulturalist, **William Cattley** (1788 – 1835) received a consignment of ferns from Brazil, which had some unknown, leathery plants included as packing material. Curious, Cattley planted some. Three years later he was ecstatic at the emergence of the most beautiful exotic flowers.

In 1823, Cattley hired the eminent Orchidologist, John Lindley, to catalogue his plants, and to describe his wonderful new orchid. Lindley recognised the similarities of this orchid to one which flowered a little earlier, then incorrectly named *Epidendrum violaceum* of Loddiges. He immediately created a new genus, *Cattleya*, in honour of William Cattley

In his work, COLLECTANIA BOTANICA 1824 he corrected the genus of *Epi. violaceum to Cattleya loddigesii* and he named Cattley's orchid *C labiata,* in reference to its beautiful labellum. The former was a bifoliate (two leaves), while the latter was a unifoliate (single leaf), each representing a distinct group within the Cattleya family.

*Cattleya labiata* took England and the whole of Europe by storm. Its flowers became corsages for the aristocracy and the new genus Cattleya became synonymous with orchids for more than 60 years. By the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century, the perfumed, dainty Asian cymbidiums began gaining momentum, giving the opportunity to less affluent citizens to own and grow orchids.

For decades, the unifoliate *C. labiata* remained the only representative of this species. Other varieties were discovered, but were of different colour, bloomed at different times, or displayed a unique horticultural aspect. Botanically, most of these unifoliate cattleyas were considered as varieties and subvarieties of *C labiata*, with Cattley's plant considered as *C labiata* vera ( the true *C labiata*)

As the number of variants grew, and as hybridisation began to utilise these forms, the cumbersome botanical nomenclature was modified, and the varietal names were raised to the rank of individual species. Thus today, we speak of *C. mossiae, C. dowiana, C. trianae, C. gaskelliana, C. warscewiczii, C. maxima* and *C. labiata* of course, just to name some of the better known unifoliate cattleyas.

## The SA 2022 ORCHID FAIR.

Fresh from his write-up of last year's orchid Fair published in Orchids Australia, Alan Davies has given us his impression of <u>this year's Fair</u> at the Campbelltown Functions Centre.

"Over the long weekend in June, the 2022 South Australian Orchid Fair was staged by member Clubs of the South Australian Regional Orchid Council, comprising participating Orchid Clubs from South Australia and Mildura.

The new venue was the Campbelltown Function Centre, 172 Montacute Road. Rostrevor. and despite being in a new location, the Fair was a *great success*. This is still South Australia's Premier Orchid Show for the year, at which vendors from leading orchid nurseries and garden horticultural specialists, both local and interstate. offered an extensive range of orchid genera and garden products.

The show consisted of floor and tabletop displays, with each Club and members competing for various prizes and awards. South Coast Club was adjudged to have, the best overall display. and the Champion Orchid was a spectacular *Paph*. Fanaticum from Michael and Oui.

Cultural and information sheets on growing orchids were available, with experienced growers on hand to give free advice and answer questions. Orchid Potting demonstrations on dividing and potting orchids were conducted throughout both days of the Fair by Rob Wood from Millicent Club

. A <u>sterling effort</u>, mostly from Orchidaceous and Native Orchid Club members all working in harmony, ensured that the Light Lunches, Devonshire Teas and refreshments were readily available, and the entry and raffle desks were manned. The feedback from both the general public and the vendors was very positive although some changes to layout and arrangement will be needed next time."

**S.A. NATIVE ORCHID SOCIETY** The Les Nesbitt Propagation Facility

In May, 2022, Garry and I attended the opening of the Les Nesbitt Propagation Facility of the S. A. Native Orchid Society, at Heritage Court, Oakden.

The S.A. Native Orchid Society meets in a part of the former Hillcrest Hospital kitchen. Their facility comprises a meeting room, and another laboratory-type room which houses the laminar flow cupboards. A smaller room houses the autoclave and other equipment.

Outside in what is the carpark area, there are several large shadehouses where hundreds of small plants of numerous varieties are growing. It appears that before long, more shadehouses will be required.

There was plenty to see inside the building. Along one shelf in the meeting room, the Native Orchid Perpetual trophies were on display. At one end of this room was a small trading table; amongst the stock, beginner's packs were available for Beginner's packs, made by the sale. members, contain a spray bottle, a clear pot, a sandwich bag of small bark chips, Keiki instructions, & photograph. These packs are in a coreflute box and resealable bag. Clearly, this facility is a work in progress, as the building is quite old. In terms of plant propagation, there is a great deal being done by a small group of very enthusiastic members.

I can only say "Congratulations, and well done" to the members of the Native Orchid Society, and a thank you for the invitation to attend.

## PLANTS SHOWN LAST MONTH

Open Div. Champion and also Registrar's Plant of the Night was Michael & Oui's Paphiopedilum Fanaticum, a Chinese slipper orchid with tessellated foliage., It had a long straight stem and a regal looking bloom taking after its Paph *micranthum* parent growing strongly on a miniature plant in a small pot a lovely exhibit. (see cover photo) which was Grand Champion orchid at the recent SA Orchid Fair. lt was a seedling, too.

First Div featured only one plant, an early flowering of a very good Hilda Poxon cross in the Native Hybrid section. It well deserved its placing as it featured a mature plant with good large blooms, and with good presentation, something some Hilda miss Poxons out on. plant А reflecting Joe Cassar's usual good culture.

**Second** Div was won by Sarka Laznicka's *Ctt* Meadii, a hardy bifoliate type cattleya which flowers readily on tall, slim pseudobulbs. Multiple flowers on each raceme, too. A very reliable bloomer on mature plants, its inflorescence follows the *Ctt forbesii* parent's structure..
