MY ORCHID JOURNEY PART TWO. Vanda Rounsefell.

Background

• Vanda returns to Australia in this second part of her orchid journey, and happily, comes to South Australia.

South Australia

My personal family moved to Brisbane from medical residency in Cairns in 1969, then to Adelaide in 1971. By that time I had 2 ½ children and was soon kept very busy dealing with a 3 month prem baby soon after our arrival, as well as hanging onto my medical practice by the fingernails. But after a final baby and a number of years, we had the opportunity to buy a patch of dirt which included a Heritage ruin opposite the Talisker Conservation Park above Cape Jervis. The hills, formerly denuded by forest clearance to support a silver-lead-zinc mine, are now covered by regenerated open sclerophyll, mainly stringybark forest, and in Springtime, the undergrowth puts on a display of wattles and beautiful native terrestrial orchids, many on our own land. Last year I was most upset to be forced by the local fire officer to de-fuel 100 undisturbed years' worth of regrowth scrub habitat. Heaven knows what has become of my terrestrial orchids, but Spring is when to look.

Transition from passive admirer to active grower

I always imagined I would grow orchids once I retired. That's a bit of a joke, as I retired at 79 from medicine only last December. Meanwhile, 6-7 years ago, a colleague thought it most amusing to give me a Vanda orchid for Xmas.

That (tropical) Vanda cost me a fortune! I 'had' to buy a greenhouse and lots of gear. I had no idea really about growing, so I joined the Orchidaceous Society and The Orchid Club of SA, went to workshops, joined the Fern Society for good measure and suddenly found myself with the beginners' disease of trying one of everything and VERY rapidly amassing an unwieldy set of small collections with different needs – and a full-blown addiction which members will well recognise.

My greenhouse is only 3m x 2.8m, with aluminium frame and 10mm, twin-wall polycarbonate structure (Grow-Fresh). I had a terrible time in Adelaide metro (a rental bouse) trying to stabilise the temperature and humidity, especially in Summer. So I could choose an over-heating greenhouse (45-50°C sometimes), or an open verandah, (no shadehouse) or a very dark house. Mind you, the Vanda really was amazing when she finally deigned to flower this year after having been told she was flowering-ready 7 years ago.

Moving to Aldinga in 2020

Having moved to Aldinga, I have a much better setup, as the greenhouse is protected from the West. It is bolted to the top on a 23,000L underground tank, and I have a pile of old bricks under a bench for extra thermal mass. Mind you, while it was no fun putting the greenhouse up, it

promised to be a nightmare moving it after a number of years. That problem was solved for me by my greatly appreciated handy person Andy, who did both sides of the operation in a fraction of the time my whole family took to erect it – there's DIY and there's DI+help! Many of my little charges went off to a friend's shadehouse for up to a year. Many liked the humidity but quite a few died,- probably from well-meant over-watering.

So what now?

My build included power and hot & cold water inside the greenhouse. There's an evaporative cooler system to the ceiling set to go off over 20°C. And a gentle oscillating fan. Two 400W metal cylinder heaters come on below about 14°C. I have solar intentions and some gear but to date no time to design anything. There are 2 solar fans in the roof, one defunct. And auto vents in the roof as well. Mostly I keep warm and cloud forest things in there: Vanda, Vanilla, Cattleya, tropical ferns, Iron Cross Begonias, Tillandsia, pitcher plant, baby plants, a few Dens & Sarcs down low but destined elsewhere.

I water by hand as it keeps me related to the individual orchids. I have some useless foggers and an uninstalled misting outfit. I'm very erratic about feeding orchids, so I use a bit of sustained release food and intermittent hand spray. I have a number of different nutrient mixes and vary them intuitively. I would do much better if I were more organised and consistent. Nevertheless, I do have quite a few things flowering, mostly one thing or two at a time, and sometimes they attract awards.

I've been in my Aldinga house for 2 years – a very different climate, VERY windy. More and more orchids are creeping into the house (which they love). I bought 6 baby Zygos years ago. They should have flowered a couple of years back, but sulked instead. As soon as I brought them indoors they went mad with flowering.

Apart from the greenhouse I have also a South side fernery that supports some speciosum rock lilies, other Dens and Cyms, but it's a bit dark, more ferny. And I have more Cyms and Epidendrums under an East side verandah, protected by shade cloth. They have a bit more light there but they do have to put up with blasts of cold air coming from my heat pump hot water system. They had been sulking for some time in the fernery, and I now hope for a bit of flowering – I see one spike at least, so hope for more.

I have had some recent health issues that ordain a far more regulated life. Orchids quite like 'regular' – so watch this space!

August, September, October Meetings Notes from Garry.

The August Dinner meeting seems quite a long way back; this is probably because we had no September Meeting, but instead we had a very busy period.

must go to Thanks All who helped make the Dinner Meeting such a success; we have not had any complaints yet, but this may be because we have not had a meeting. Hopefully, there was nothing to complain about. Delivery of tables and fencing to the Gillies Plains Shopping Centre took place on the Monday Night preceding Spring Show. our Many members were not available on the Tuesday Night to help, but they did a wonderful job on Monday night. **Thanks** for your efforts.

The September Meeting was cancelled due to the lack of numbers of people who would have been able to attend, the majority of club members were in attendance at Gilles Plains, supplying plants, setting up displays and trading tables and judging until after the shops had closed.

The death of Queen Elizabeth resulted in a Day of Mourning, which was the first day of our show and so we lost half a day of trading. No one was permitted into the centre before mid-day,

which resulted in the Trading Table being inundated with customers before the till was brought out and the card-reader had a chance to connect and begin working.

The raffle did not bring in the income which is normally had we had three produced: not plants, we would covered costs, but thanks to Jan Whibley, who donated a quilt, we had a plant for First and Third prize, and Orchid Ouilt (made by the Late Jeanette Melbourne) as a second prize. The winner of the second prize was 'over the moon'; she was going to give the prize to her mother who is in to both quilting and orchids. I fear the orchid bug may have got to this winner; she spent a considerable sum on the small plants which were packed up as we closed.

Thanks go to Kevin must Gurney, who decided to reduce collection his and avoid repotting by donating a number of plants to the Peter **McCauley** Society. helped with pricing the plants which I had collected, apart from four plants, the remainder sold for the price listed on them. One was marked down and sold, and three suffusums without flower spikes remained. More about Kevin's donation later.

Shirley French donated a large number of quality orchid books to the club. Alan Davies set about pricing them, selling \$50 worth while doing so. Only a few of these books remained. Thank you, Shirley.

For me, the end of the show took much longer than normal. Usually I put items away as they come out of the ute and This time, it was a trailer. matter of putting away items which would not be required in the next week, keeping that would which be used and adding everything else for our Sales Day, plus own committee meeting on Monday Night and Rare Fruits Society on Tuesday night.

We were very lucky with the weather for our Sales Day. Our arrived customers droves, particularly starting time. Before lunch, we had made sufficient cash sales to cover the cost of the Hall and the advertising. At the end of the day, everyone went home with considerably fewer plants than when they arrived. Thanks to everyone for their The Hall was empty efforts. and spick and span before 4.30p.m.

I must mention more about Kevin Gurney's donation. After loading plants and pots Kevin said that he had 3 plants for the wheelie

earwigs bin; had eaten the flowers and they needed repotting. I could not let them go to waste, so collected them as well. Concerned that Jane Higgs might be bored at the Sales Day, I took them for her to divide and repot. Next I got the message that Jane wanted me to suggest prices. l was able to 'pass the buck' and said to Jane, "You are the person repotting them, so put whatever price you think they are worth. Everything we get is profit". One speciosum, showing a single discernable flower, she divided into half and two quarters and repotted, selling them instantly for a total of \$80. We still have the pieces of the others to grow on for the next time.

I thought that some of Kevin's plants would sell better at the Sales Day: I was wrong, and we have a large Sharry Baby, an *Oncidium leucochilum* and two *Encyclia atropurpureum* (one in spike) for sale, as well as a number of new 200mm. (8 inch) pots at 10 for \$12.

If I have not thanked you already, please be assured that your efforts are/were much appreciated.

As Treasurer, I am always willing to relieve you of your money, cash is something many people do not carry as much these days but our new bank card reader makes it much easier. At this stage, it costs us nothing, all that I have to do is remember to bring it to meetings!
