MY ORCHID JOURNEY Vanda Rounsefell

Background

Melbourne

I was born in Melbourne during WW2. My lawyer father, a bit of a *Renaissance Man*, was already into orchids in a modest way. I was named *Vanda Barbara*, a bit of family humour: "Barbara (Latin barbarian), implies a wild strain —"our little galloping orchid!" he said. So then he disappeared into the Air Force (Sq 10, England, Sunderland flying boats) when I was 7 months old, returning to the Melbourne bar in 1945 after the war was over. He was lucky — 4/5 were killed at one stage.

In 1950s Melbourne, Dad grew Cymbidiums in the open, under a huge Magnolia tree. I watered them after school. He had about 20 big pots, all flowered prolifically: pink ones and green ones, my favourite – those were labelled Lowianum, which I memorised. It was mandatory for departing guests to be given arms full of orchid spikes, with strict instructions for keeping them alive for weeks. He prettied them up with a fine misting spray attached to the sink in the kitchen, and said to take off a tiny slice with a razor blade each day, and change the water.

TPNG

In 1957 when I was 15, the family moved to Port Moresby. The Territory of Papua & New Guinea was a naturalist's heaven. At only 42, Dad became the youngest Chief Justice in the world, young enough to leap at full throttle into a land full of natural wonders and interesting people. His work took him away from home 'on circuit', 10 months of the year. He travelled all over the Territory, and we couldn't wait for his return(s), as he always came back dripping with prizes: specimens of mosquitoes for the local malariologist, unnamed beetles and other insects for the entomologist, artefacts for the museum, pottery from remote markets and very often orchids he found in the jungle, many of which were new to science. He kept up a running correspondence with the Bernice Bishop Museum in Hawaii, and dissected some of his specimens, getting me to draw them to illustrate his notes.

Moresby is very dry, hot and quite windy. Dad had a collection of orchids growing under the house on the structural posts and lattice near where we had barbecues and long, lazy colonial nights. This was a bit protected from the Trade winds, but it was really quite open. I remember some names: Oncidium, Arachnis, Bulbophyllum, Dendrobium. He fed them with "Aquasol with a dash of detergent", and again, I often watered them — with superchlorinated and undrinkable town water. They grew just fine.

My parents were great mates with Hermon Slade and his friend Geoff Elworthy, both well known to the global orchid community, who were living in Port Moresby at that time. Hermon named two Dendrobiums he bred after my parents (Den. Alan Mann and Den. Yvonne Mann). He and Geoff themselves had dens named after them, and I was privy to many of their learned conversations, doing my silent-but-all-ears teenage hanging-out thing in their shadow.

Dad was also well acquainted with Andrée Millar from Lae, a renowned expert on PNG orchids. I went to boarding and then medical school with her daughter. When Dad died distressingly young from a stroke at 56, unknown people snuck into our garden and stole many of his orchids. When Andrée heard about this she came to Moresby, and based on his remnants and many of her own plants, built a comprehensive *Sir Alan Mann Memorial Orchid Collection*, planned to be a living memorial to him at the TPNG Museum and Art Gallery, which he was instrumental in establishing. AfterIndependence, I thought I might visit, so tried to discover details of this collection, but it seems to have vanished. The new Director of the Museum & Art Gallery said he'd never seen it, but thought there might have been something like it at the House of Assembly, but no!. A dead end, mystery unsolved. If any members have knowledge of what happened or of current whereabouts, if any, I'd be fascinated to hear!

As a uni student I always made myself orchid corsages to wear to all the dances, a social fashion of the day, supposedly a partner's responsibility but unaffordable for most. Florists' wire was cheap!



I was lucky enough to have Dad alive to see me through marriage in Brisbane in 1964. He saw to it that a bouquet of white phalaenopsis came down from Townsville for me, with dear little green orchid buttonholes for the men. Not sure what they were. I went to a mad lot of trouble hand-moulding fine icing phalaenopsis flowers for the wedding cake.

Wow!. With Vanda's life being so involved with orchids, it was so prophetic when her parents gave her a name of such a lovely and important orchid genus.

Next month we will conclude her story about when she came to Australia and became involved with orchid growing at Aldinga here in South Australia.

This well known plant grows well, with lovely long pendulous racemes with miniature white blooms, and this time had 6 spikes.

Open Division

Dendrobium 'Avril's Gold, spectacularly presented by Michael & Oui had 28 racemes of clear yellow blooms and won the Registrar's Choice. .Many of this crossing are slow growing, but the rich colouration of some ,and the addition of reddish spotting makes it a hybrid well worth growing.
