Dendrobium speciosum var pedunculatum.

Before the various *Den.speciosum* varieties were sorted by the taxonomists, this particular variety was just known as *Den speciosum var compactum*, the name referring to the diminutive growth habit of its pseudobulbs. The length of the mature canes varies from about 5cm in some forms, to about 20 cm with the tall forms.

Den. var pedunculatum is found mainly growing on exposed rock faces, where its small stature copes more easily with harsh summer sunlight conditions shadehouse conditions the pseudobulbs In can arow progressively longer, but one experienced NSW grower finds they grow and flower better right up close to the sarlon shadecloth. The size of the flowers are not miniature, as the plant's stature might indicate, and the colour range can vary from pure white to mainly cream, but do not feature the bright yellows which is an attractive characteristic of other Den speciosum varieties... If you want seedlings which will give you brightly coloured results, it might be better to steer away from plants bred using var pedunculatum, unless the breeder can show results otherwise.

One distinctive feature is that the canes flower only from the top of the canes. They can repeat flowering from the same cane as in other years, but do not form inflorescences from nodes adjacent to the lower leaves on the cane.

The revised name describes its most important feature, the peduncle, which is the stalk which attaches the flowers to the top of the plant's pseudobulbs (or canes as they are sometimes called.). Other forms of *Den. speciosum* have the sprays of blooms starting close to the main pseudobulb, but this Variety has .a distinct bare stem before the spray of flowers form.

One clone I have, regularly flowers earliest of all my speciosums, and I had two pieces blooming for the SA. Orchid Fair last year.

Their natural habitat is around the Atherton tableland, which indicates that it likes the cooler climate which the higher altitude indicates.

We saw samples of these last month, (see cover photo of *Cym* Koala), also Vanda Rounsefell's *Cym* Peewee, and Joe Cassar's *Cym*. Cricket.

Joe's *Den nobile* plants are usually specimen size with large canes. The smaller canes may be due to the reduced water & feeding due to mounting the plant on a block, but the overall result is effective.
